TISHA B'AV HALACHOS

Shalosh Seudos should be eaten Shabbos afternoon after Mincha. One may drink wine and eat meat at this meal. Shalosh Seudos must be concluded by 7:57 PM.

Tisha B'av evening (Saturday night), the fast begins at 7:57 PM. One must remove one's shoes at home at 8:47 PM. Before doing so, and also before doing melacha, one must say Boruch hamavdil bein kodesh lechol. After changing shoes, one should light the havdalah candle and only recite the bracha of Borei me'orei ha'aish. At that point, one may change into weekday clothes. Maariv will take place at 9:15 PM followed by Eicha. It is not necessary to bring sneakers to Shul before Shabbos.

Sunday evening, the fast ends at 8:46 PM. Before one eats, havdalah must be recited. It is permissible to drink wine for havdalah. One does not make a bracha on the candle or besamim at this time. One should not eat meat, drink wine (except for havdalah) or listen to music until Monday morning. Sunday night after the fast is over, one may bathe, take a haircut, shave, and do laundry.

Ephraim Deinard (1846-1930)

Ephraim Deinard's life was centered around books. He was a publisher, an editor, a journalist, an essayist and a poet. But foremost he was a bookdealer. I don't mean simply a bookseller. Deinard traveled the world in search of rare manuscripts and books. He uncovered one of a kind editions. He rescued books and manuscripts from Jewish communities scattered throughout Europe, Asia and North Africa. He bought, sold, appraised and bartered books. He found and sold rare Jewish manuscripts to the U. of London, to Cambridge U., and the great Bodleian Library at Oxford. He had a pioneering role in establishing several major Jewish library collections in America. When he immigrated to the United States in 1888, he came with a wife, four children and 11 suitcases. His wife bought new clothes for the family because most of the luggage was full of manuscripts and books.

Ephraim Deinard was born in Latvia in 1846. For almost forty years, his life was part of the tumultuous politics of czarist Russia. When he came to this country, America became his legal residence, but the entire world was the focus of his ongoing travels. By the late 1880s, he had well known clients throughout Europe; when he arrived in America his extensive operation was enlarged.

Deinard was in correspondence with a network of scholars, wealthy private collectors and notable rabbis. He was in contact with the famous English traveler and book-collector, Elkan N. Adler, son the British Chief Rabbi, and from Paris came requests from Rabbi Zadok Kahn, Chief Rabbi of France. He received letters from Isidore Loeb, secretary of the Alliance Israelite Universelle, Albert Cohn, a French philanthropist and scholar, and he was in steady communication with Moritz Steinschneider, the greatest of the 19th century Jewish bibliographers.

A prolific author, editor, and publisher, Deinard produced more than 70 volumes on subjects from Jewish history during the Second Temple and Talmudic period, medieval and modern Hebrew literature, to treatises about hasidism, Christianity, Communism, and Zionism. His extensive journeys resulted in three travel books describing his experiences. Deinard's writings remain a treasure-trove for students of Hebrew bibliography.

In Washington, D.C., the extensive Judaic holdings of the Library of Congress are based on a core collection of nearly 10,000 books and pamphlets, including 19 incunabula that were purchased from Ephraim Deinard, with financial support from the businessman and philanthropist Jacob Schiff. Two additional collections were acquired from Deinard in 1916 and 1921. These four collections total more than 20,000 volumes and include Hebrew manuscripts, incunabula, rare books, as well as the Library's most important Hebraic treasure - an illuminated medieval manuscript dated 1478, now called the <u>"Washington Haggadah."</u>

In addition to Deinard's acquisitions for the Library of Congress in Washington, he was instrumental in developing the manuscript and library collection at the Jewish Theological Seminary, New York, the Harvard College library, and the Hebrew Union College library in Cincinnati.

Deinard had a close connection to New Jersey. He lived in Newark from more than 30 years. He established a printing press in Newark and later in Kearny. Ephraim Deinard died in 1930, at the age of 84.
